MARTIN is a parish on the borders of Hampshire and Dorsetshire, 5 miles north-west from Fordingbridge station on the Salisbury and Dorchester section of the London and South Western railway, 4 north-east from Cranborne (Dorset) and 9½ south-west-by-south from Salisbury, in the Southern division of the county, South Damerham hundred, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, Fordingbridge union, county court district of Salisbury, rural deanery of Chalk (Chalk portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The church of All Saints is an ancient structure of stone, rubble and brick, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts and north aisle under separate roof, its length intersecting the transept on that side, and square western tower surmounted by heavy octagonal spire, containing 3 bells: it was repaired and internally restored in 1857 and reseated with open benches and has 223 sittings. The register dates from the year 1590. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £60, gross yearly value £302, net £276, including 3 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of South Damerham, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Eardley Wilmot Michell, jun. M.A. of Corpus Christi college, Cambridge. Here are Congregational and Primitive Methodist chapels. There is a charity here bequeathed by William Talk, of Salisbury, between the years 1790 and 1800, of 8s. per week and 59 faggots and

MELKSHAM.

MELKSHAM is a market and union and county court town, and head of a petty sessional division, and parish, with a station on the Wilts, Somerset and Weymouth branch of the Great Western railway, 100 miles from London, 30 north-west from Salisbury, 6 north-east from Bradford, 5 north-east from Trowbridge, 7 west from Devizes, 9½ from Westbury, 14 from Warminster, 12 east from Bath, 7 south from Chippenham and 5 south-south-east from Corsham, in the Western division of the county, hundred of the same name, rural deanery of Potterne (Bradford portion), archdeaconry of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury.

During the West Saxon era this was a place of considerable note; at the period of the Norman survey and for several subsequent reigns it was held in royal demesne, and gave name to an extensive forest. The town is on the main road from London through Devizes to Bath, and consists principally of one street nearly a mile in length; it has been governed by a Local Board from 1878, until the "Local Government Act, 1894," established the present Urban District Council, and it is well paved and lighted with gas by a company, and well supplied with water by the Trowbridge Water Company: the houses are built of soft freestone, but irregularly placed. The river Avon divides the town and is crossed by a handsome bridge of four arches, with light and elegant balustrades. The Wilts and Berks canal passes on the east of the town, and about 1½ miles southward joins the Kennet and Avon canal.

There are two mineral springs, one saline and the other chalybeate, in the vicinity; and in 1816 a new saline spa was obtained by boring to a depth of 351½ feet; it was anticipated that Melksham would advance into note in consequence of the medicinal qualities these waters possessed, and every accommodation for visitors was provided, including a pump-room, hot and cold baths, a handsome crescent and an agreeable promenade; but after a very great outlay, the wells did not prove attractive and are now little used.

The church of St. Michael is a spacious structure of freestone, chiefly of Perpendicular work, dates from the Norman period, consisting of a Norman chancel, nave of five bays, and aisles, north porch, with an embattled tower surmounted by pinnacles and containing 6 bells: it was restored and enlarged in 1840, when the central tower was removed and the present tower built at the west end; and again restored in 1881, when an organ was added: in 1891 the church was reseated with oak seats, a new floor was put in, the roof was opened, and a handsome carved oak screen and brass lectern were given by C. F. Rumboll esq. M.D.: in 1894 the reredos was restored at considerable cost by the trustees of the late Sir John Awdry: the sittings, in number 600, are all free. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge commuted at £1010, average £682, net income £191, with 3 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Edwin

George Wyld B.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, and surrogate.

There is a handsome chapel (St. Andrew's) about 1 mile from the town, built in the Early English style, at the sole expense of the late Rev. E. L. Barnwell, of Melksham House, for the use of the district of Sandridge and Melksham Forest: it consists of chancel, nave and south porch, and western bell turret containing one bell: there are 200 sittings: adjoining the chapel there is a building comprising a Sunday school-room, and house for the use of the sexton, built in the year 1880, from plans given by the late G. E. Street esq. R.A. holding 150 children.

The Society of Friends' meeting house, King street, erected in 1734, has 300 seats.

The Baptist chapel, Broughton road, founded in 1669, has 400 sittings. Ebenezer Baptist chapel, Union street, erected in 1835, will seat 150 persons. The Baptist chapel, Forest, erected in 1839, has seats for 110 persons.

The Congregational chapel, Market place, founded in 1773, has 400 sittings.

The Primitive Methodist chapel, Forest, will seat 150 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel, Market place, erected in 1872, has 450 seats.

The Town Hall and Cheese Market were erected in 1847 by a company of shareholders at an expense of £3,350; they form a spacious and well-arranged edifice of white freestone, in the Italian style. The New Hall, Market place, built by Miss Fowler, is a building of Bath stone, and is used for lectures and meetings; it will hold 200 persons. The market is held on every

alternate Tuesday in the month for cattle, sheep and pigs. A fair for cattle, sheep and horses is held in the Market place on the 27th of July.

The manufacture of flat and round rope, haircloths, cocoa fibre and sacking are carried on here. There is also an india rubber factory carried on by the Avon India Rubber Co. Limited.

A Cottage Hospital was established here in 1868, containing 7 beds.

Bruges' charity of about £20 yearly, half of which goes to Seend, is distributed in blankets by the vicar and churchwardens at Christmas. There are also two small charities, left by the Rev. Bohun Fox and Mr. Pritchard respectively, for the benefit of the poor, at the discretion of the vicar.

The principal landowners are Walter Hume Long esq. M.P. of Rood Ashton House, who is lord of the manor, Lord Methuen, Ralph Ludlow Lopes esq. of Sandridge Park, and the trustees of the late W. P. Bruges esq.

The area of the civil parish is 8,303 acres; rateable value £24,350; the population in the town in 1891 was 2,073, of the civil parish, 4,284, and of the ecclesiastical, 3,638.

The parish was originally divided into 7 tithings, Shaw and Whalley, Beanacre, Blachmere, Woolmere, Canhold, Woodrow, and the town tithing.

Beanacre is a tithing 1 mile north-west. Here is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1839. Blackmore, 1 mile south-east is also a tithing. A mission chapel was erected in 1887, capable of holding 100 persons. A school-room adjoining was added in 1890.

MERE is a union town and parish on the borders of three counties—Wilts, Dorset and Somerset—which meet in the vicinity, and is on the road from Salisbury to Taunton Dean, 4 miles north from Gillingham station on the Salisbury and Yeovil branch of the South Western railway, 23 west-by-north from Salisbury, 7 west from Hindon, 7 east-by-north from Wincanton and 102 from London, in the Southern division of the county, Mere hundred, Tisbury and Mere petty sessional division, county court district of Shaftesbury, Wylve rural deanery (Heytesbury portion), archdeaconry of Sarum and diocese of Salisbury. The town is lighted with gas from works erected in 1866. The church of St. Michael the Archangel is a stone building, consisting of chancel with chapels, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles and north and south porches, over each of which is a parvise and square western tower 100 feet high, surmounted at the angles by four lofty pinnacles and contains 6 musical bells, clock and chimes: the chancel is separated from the nave by a beautifully carved oak screen: in a Gothic niche over the north porch is the figure of a saint: the chantry chapels are the oldest part, which is of the 14th century; one is used as the vestry and the other for daily prayer: in the south chapel is a very ancient brass to John Bettesthorpe, who died in 1398: there are traces of Early English work (about the year 1220) in the buttresses at the east end and in the corbels which formerly came under the eaves, and are to be seen in the south chancel wall: the present chancel and the north and south chapels were built in the 14th century with some portions of the church, but there was apparently a great remodelling of the church when the tower was built about the middle of the 15th century: there are 600 sittings: in 1883 the churchyard was levelled and planted with shrubs and flowers. The registers are in a good state of preservation, and date from 1572, and the churchwardens' books, still preserved, date from 1556. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £295, net yearly value £220, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, and held since 1890 by the Rev. John Augustus Lloyd M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford, and surrogate. The mission church of St. Matthew, about 1½ miles south of the town, and on the Shaftesbury road, opened in 1882, is an edifice of stone and brick, and consists of chancel, apse, nave and north porch, with central bell turret containing one bell, and will seat 150 persons: the cost of erection was about £1,000, raised by voluntary subscriptions, the site being the gift of Miss Grove; it is served by the clergy of St. Michael the Archangel. Here is a Congregational chapel, a large Gothic structure, erected at a cost of over £5,000, at the sole expense of Charles Jupe esq. built of local Bath and Ham Hill stone; also a Primitive Methodist chapel and one for the Plymouth Brethren. The Society of Friends have a meeting house here. The Cemetery, on the south side of the town, consisting of about two acres, was opened in 1856: during the excavations necessary in its formation an earthen vessel was discovered containing 400 Roman coins of very ancient date: two mortuary chapels have been erected; it is under the control of a burial board of 9 members. The market, formerly held on Tuesday, has now become extinct, also the annual fairs that were held on the 17th of May and the 10th of October. In the Market place was formerly a market house of great antiquity, which being in a dilapidated state it was found necessary to take it down, and on the site H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, as Duke of Cornwall, erected in 1866 a clock tower with illuminated dials. The Church Institute, in the Market place, was established in the year 1885, and is under the management of the vicar as president and a committee of six members; in connection therewith is a Temperance hotel, having reading rooms, together with a library. The charities amount to £158 yearly: Gillingham Forest charity, arising from inclosure of land at Gillingham Forest, produces £100 yearly, and is distributed in shares: the allotment charity, derived from land in Gillingham parish, yields £20 annually, and is distributed to the poor. John Phillips left by his will the sum of £800, the interest of which, after paying for the repairs of tomb, and partly for support of Sunday school, is distributed by the churchwardens; there are a few minor charities. To the south of the town there is an ancient Manor House, now used as a farm house, and called Woodlands, in which is an ancient chapel. Mere constitutes a part of the Duchy of Cornwall: in the year 1253 permission was given to Richard, Earl of

Cornwall, to build a castle on the hill, now known as Castle Hill, and afterwards to fortify it, of which some traces were found during excavations in 1887. The principal landowners are H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, who is lord of the manor, George Troyte-Chafyn-Grove esq. the trustees of the late Meyrick Bankes esq. and A. R. White esq. The soil is various, clay, chalk and flint; subsoil, chalk and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, beans and oats to the north; and on the south of the town (which is principally clay) fine grazing land. The Ashfield water rises from a chalk hill in the neighbourhood, and after turning several mills joins the river Stour. The parish contains 7,310 acres; rateable value, £10,957; the population in 1891 was 749 in the civil and 2,279 in the ecclesiastical parish, including 49 officers and inmates in the workhouse.
